

Greetings dear colleagues,

I would like to give you my opinion regarding the SOP on Cancer made by our colleague and friend Dr. Wayne, who has made an enormous effort to do so.

In line with what our legal advisor Dr. Roberto Quintero and Dr. Bernardino Clavo (radiation oncologist) have contributed, I would like to say that although it is true that there are some studies published in relation to ozone in cancer, it is far from being enough to encourage its use so categorically. I very much agree with the criteria of Dr. Clavo, who is one, if not the only, oncologist who is conducting serious research in this regard at the Negrín University Hospital in Gran Canaria.

Although Dr. Wayne has done a spectacular job and has put all his experience, wisdom and effort into it, I believe it inappropriate to mix the ozone approach with other unsupported therapies with unclear safety and efficacy in this complex pathology. With this I am not saying that it is not the appropriate comprehensive approach, I am sure that it does contribute a lot to the well-being of the patient, but in this case we are talking about a SOP that also provides protocols for action on something so uncertain and that is still under a lot of study.

To make matters worse, it is an issue that is in the eye of the hurricane and can hinder the enormous work that Dr. Bernardino Clavo does in this matter. It seems to me that in these things we must keep a low profile and I say this from my own experience. During the Covid-19 pandemic, I was the only doctor in the world who, during the height of the pandemic, began to direct an entire Covid-19 unit with around 600 patients, from moderate to severe in a Madrid hospital. In large part, this unique permissiveness was due to the fact that I kept a completely low profile and in general that is how I usually work. Those of us who are really at the forefront of research and legal issues know this very well. For about 5 years, I was facing a legal fight with the administration in complete silence, until I could speak up. Like it or not this is a fact.


Therefore, I support and consider very appropriate the decision made by our researcher Dr. Bernardino Clavo not to sign the SOP. He is constantly under the critical eye of the hospital administration and the health administration of the Canary Islands. Let's him continue working with that

low profile that characterizes him and that until now has shown that it works. In this way he will continue to produce an invaluable material for us.

As a Scientific Committee we must act with great sense, strategy and prudence in order to move forward.
